Purpose

Alola Australia was established in 2008 and works in partnership with Fundasaun Alola, a Timorese NGO founded by Kirsty Sword Gusmão in 2001 to make positive and sustainable changes in the lives of women and children in Timor-Leste.

Alola Australia and our supporters raise awareness and funds to support four key programs of **Fundasaun Alola:**

- Advocacy
- Education and Literacy
- Maternal and Child Health, and
- > Economic Empowerment

Fundasaun Alola's programs create employment, promote human rights and strengthen community development. They also help enhance the status of women. Alola's programs work hand-in-hand with the Government of Timor-Leste to achieve the nation's Development Goals.

Alola Australia is committed to enabling Fundasaun Alola undertake their work effectively and sustainably. We recognise that the interests of women, men and children are best served when local communities mobilise local community capacity. We obtain funds for Alola's development work by undertaking fundraising activities and events aiming to raise at least \$100,000 per year.

Chair's Report 2014

As each year passes Alola Australia becomes stronger in its ability to support development programs to enable women and families in Timor-Leste to build a strong and sustainable future. Our partnership with *Fundasaun Alola* is crucial to this work.

Alola Australia is a small but effective organisation run by a Board of Directors and with a large support-base across Australia. Our collaboration with *Fundasaun Alola* involves responding to the issues they identify as being important. We aim to be responsive and supportive in our commitment to building the capacity of *Fundasaun Alola*, collaborating and sharing knowledge, experience and resources to address priorities.

We maintain dialogue and close links with Fundasaun Alola via:

- Visits to Australia by Fundasaun Alola staff who are here for study, conferences and speaking engagements:
- Visits to Timor-Leste by Board Directors and other Alola supporters;
- Sharing of key documents and reports; and
- At least one meeting per year of the Alola Board with the CEO and/or Chair of Fundasaun Alola.

In **August 2014**, Alola Avos Christine Perkins, Melanie Atkins and Wendy Mayne, plus a group of Alola supporters from Australia met with Fundasaun Alola Board representatives and senior staff at Alola's office in Dili. They were introduced to Alola's key programs and Alola's current priorities which include:

- Strengthening the role and participation of women in governance an decision-making, including enhancing women's advocacy skills and supporting their participation in national and district elections;
- Offering economic empowerment programs to more women across Timor-Leste;
- Advancing the rights of women and addressing the issues of trafficking and HIV-AIDS;
- Strengthening community based maternal and child health programs and promoting the message: our village loves its mothers and children;
- Integration across programs to effect broader change, as for example, the Advocacy program working with the Maternal and Child Health Program to encourage the introduction of improved maternity leave policies in workplaces;
- Increasing the participation of young women in education;
- Developing more multi-language learning resources; and
- Enhancing handcraft development and cultural preservation initiatives, which include documenting information about the natural dyes used by weavers.

Alzira Reis, the CEO of Fundasaun Alola, met with the Alola Australia Board in April 2014 when she was in Melbourne for our annual key fundraising event. Our discussions included updates on Fundasaun Alola's programs, the many achievements, emerging advocacy issues for women in Timor-Leste, future plans, resource gaps and the formal partnership agreement between Alola Australia and Fundasaun Alola.

A quote from Maria Fátima Pereira Guterres, Acting Advocacy Manager at Fundasaun Alola:

'The greatest challenges that face women and children in Timor-Leste today are abandonment and violence. As a women's organization, Alola works holistically to answer the real and current situations faced by women. It does this by linking the Economic Empowerment Small Grants Program and the Advocacy Program to deliver information about gender based violence and relevant issues. The same integrated approach can also apply to the two other programs; Education and Maternal and Child Health. We will continue with the holistic program as it helps to raise awareness and strengthen the collaboration between the partners to respond to the common problems that exist now, so that we can achieve our dream as Alola's vision **Strong Women, Strong Nation!**'

Alola's maternal and child health programs support women and children through community based networks and health facility based programs by raising awareness, promoting good nutrition and supporting safe motherhood, newborn care, exclusive breastfeeding and birth spacing,.

By working through a community based participation approach, Alola's maternal and child health program is able to connect with women who might otherwise be hard to reach and allows for the development of community action plans to increase access to services and support for women in the community.



The successes of the program to date have seen an increase of exclusive breastfeeding from 31.7 percent in 2003 to 62.3 percent in 2014, health facility births increase from 10 percent to 22 percent and 77 community based mother support and SHIO groups established in ten districts.

A quote from Inês Soares, a 45 year old teacher at Pre-School Muki in Manatuto.



'The training offered by Fundasaun Alola is the best. I was interested in the different units of study, activities and materials which can support learning. After completing the training, I have implemented the new strategies and methodologies with the children in my school. I always prepare my lesson plans based on a theme and I do various activities with the children in the classroom. In the future I want to teach my students to hold a pencil in the proper way when they first come to school and I would also like to improve their literacy and numeracy based on the activities that I have learnt from the Alola training.'

Cipriana Amaral, is the Coordinator for the 'Feto Forte' or the 'Strong Women' group in the Quelicai-Baucau region in Timor-Leste.

Before participating in Alola's economic empowerment program my only income was from selling bread and I could not afford a university education for my children. Then, in 2003, I participated in Alola's breastfeeding program and during the program, Alola set up a weaving group in my village. Alola appointed me as the group coordinator.

My artwork has become a huge part of my life and has brought about a significant positive change for me - in my livelihood and family life. I am able to afford to send my children to university and maintain my family's health.

Principal activities, objectives and results

The principal activities during the year were to conduct awareness raising and fundraising appeals for the Australia Timor-Lesto Relief and Development Fund.

The company's mission is to partner with Fundasaun Alpia in enabling women and families in Timor Leste to build a strong future.

The company's objectives are to:

- Raise awareness, funds and create links within Australia.
- . Suild a strong and sustainable organisation in Australia

In pursuit of those objectives the directors' focus in 2014 was to increase awareness in Australia of the work of Fundasaun Alola, to raise at least \$100,000 for the programs of Fundasaun Alola, to recruit volunteers to meet the promotional activity and skill needs of the organisation, and to strengthen and improve governance. Sound progress was achieved against each of these goals.

The deficit of the entity amounted to \$1,975. As a not for profit entity, all donations received, less costs, will be distributed to Fundasaun Alola for use in a range of development projects in Timor-Leste. A deficit is incurred from an accounting perspective due to transferring money to Fundasaun Alola in 2014 that was received in 2013.

Significant events after the balance date

No matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the company, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the company in future financial years.

Capital structure

Alola Australia is a company limited by guarantee and as such does not have any share capital. Its Constitution precludes the payment of any dividends. In the event that it is wound up, the Constitution states that each member is required to contribute a reasimum of \$2 each towards meeting any outstanding obligations of the company. At 31 December 2014 there were 7 members of the company.

Note 1 Statement of significant accounting policies

Financial Reporting Framework

The Company is not a reporting entity because in the opinion of the directors, there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. Accordingly, this "special purpose financial report" has been prepared so as to provide information required by the Directors, Members and Donors. Alola Australia Ltd is a small company limited by guarantee as defined by s45B of the *Corporations Act 2001*.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of applicable Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, modified for use by non-reporting entities. It is compliant with the disclosure requirements of the following standards:

Accounting policies are selected and applied in a manner which ensures that the resulting financial information satisfies the concepts of relevance and reliability, thereby ensuring that the substance of the underlying transactions or other events is reported.

Significant Accounting Policies

Accounting policies are selected and applied in a manner which ensures that the resulting financial information satisfies the concepts of relevance and reliability, thereby ensuring that the substance of the underlying transactions or other events is reported. The following significant accounting policies have been adopted in the preparation and presentation of the financial report:

(a) Going Concern

The financial report has been prepared adopting the going concern convention which assumes continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

(b) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(c) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised and measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the entity and the revenue can be reliably measured. Gifts and donations are recognised when they are received or when the right to receive payment is established.

The Company acts as an agent for and on behalf of Fundasaun Alola to collect grants and donations from Australian supporters. The gross inflows of economic benefits in such cases are for the entire benefit of the principal and do not result in increases in equity for the Company. These amounts are therefore not the Company's revenue.

These accounts are presented in Australian dollars.

Note 2 Auditors remuneration

The auditor received \$2,500 excluding GST for the audit of this report.

Note 3 Income tax

Alola Australia Ltd has Tax Concession Charity status from the ATO (via ACNC).

Note 4 Related party transactions

Transactions between related parties are on normal commercial terms and conditions no more favourable than those available to other parties unless otherwise stated.

Note 5 Economic dependency

The future operations of the company are dependent upon the continuation of adequate funding from donors and grantors.
